

Beautiful Boredom

Everybody wants their child to be able to solve problems, resolve conflict, and manage their life. But sometimes it's as if we are going backwards when looking at how children in general are achieving these skills. Children who lack problem solving skills may be more at risk of mental health challenges later in life if these skills are not honed during childhood.

It's really tempting to jump in and quickly solve our children's issues for them – this could be as involved as personally attempting to sort out peer issues for them at school, to something as innocent as opening a jar for them. It's quick, it's easy, it gets results, which is pretty tempting when we have multiple pressures coming at us from all sides. It saves time.

This is where boredom comes into its own. Most of us have a story about how we used to disappear for the day as children and would only come home when it was getting dark, or we were hungry. I certainly do! And while we have added risks and complexities in our lives now that would make this a little harder, the fact is that we used to learn how to solve problems, build creativity and to manage ourselves when it was just us against the world. Our boredom became our stage for learning.

There are ways that we can bring aspects of this concept back into the lives of our children without potentially putting them at risk. Help them to brainstorm 3-4 things that they could spend the morning doing and discuss the merits and drawbacks of each. Help them to come up with ideas for a long-term project such as creating a garden plot, a hut, or an art project. This will also allow children to develop planning, strategy and flexibility skills, and it can help to build tolerance when things don't always go their way.

If your child comes to you with a problem, such as wanting you to peel a banana for them, instead of doing it for them (the quick way, I know), help them to think of several ways in which they could solve the problem – no matter how ridiculous. They may try to use the potato peeler at first, and that is fine – this is problem solving. Sometimes we need to embrace failure while they need to experience consequences, positive and negative. They will soon realise that there are other, better ways, all while building grit and learning to self-soothe in the process.

Helping children by encouraging them to manage their own boredom can be so beneficial in so many ways. Having that unstructured time will allow them the space to develop personal independence and will feel as though they have more autonomy over their lives, which in general will create more motivated, contented and happy children.

FIORDLAND COLLEGE NOTICE




Please also keep noise to a minimum for our students in exams.
